Lay of the land

Once I asked a senior citizen where she thought that phrase may have come from. 'The pioneers,' she thought.

Old Strathcona looks back in the mind's eye for over half a century. "A pleasant little body of water nestled in a poplar grove. There were trails—just two or three---down to its reeded edge and in the golden eventide the little lake lay quietly, throwing back to the sky the blues, golds and scarlets of the fading day." In an earlier Journal article of 1914, McKernan's lake was very much in the limelight. That year had been wet, causing the lake to rise, some 12 feet. City engineers had started to install sewers in the area. Ditches were dug to take the runoff which ended up in McKernan Lake. Sewage drained into the lake. Rather than spending oodles of money to drain the lake, Edmonton city council decided to spend three-four thousand dollars to drain off the flooded lots surrounding the lake. The decision to drain the lake was made later.

In March of 2025, some alleys and streets are filled with pools of water because of 'the lay of the land' we live in. Large trucks constructing new homes create larger pools. In 1914, the ghost of McKernan lake referred to rising waters, drainage difficulties that ironically still occur.

McKernan beats city's tree canopy goal

McKernan has some of the highest tree canopy cover in Edmonton outside of the river valley! We have 33% canopy cover, compared to the city goal of 20%. This is according to Dustin Bajer, a local "educator, master gardener, beekeeper, and nature-inspired designer" who has tracked citytree canopy coverage at his blog <u>dustinbajer</u>. <u>com/edmonton-tree-canopy-coverage-by-neighbourhood</u>. Currently, the Edmonton tree canopy is sitting around 13%, according to Bajer.

Other than river Valley areas such as Laurier and Whitemud Creek, other well-treed areas include Windsor Park (34%), Glenora and Parkallen (both 33%), and Belgravia and Garneau (both 30%).

Unfortunately, urban trees are often stressed by lack of water, pollution, physical damage from things like snow removal, root compaction from construction, or disease. Not to mention the large losses of private trees that are removed during infill construction.

If you have property, consider planting a tree (or large shrub). The city has a list of native trees and shrubs that are hardy and suitable for Edmonton conditions. The list at www.edmonton.ca/sites/default/files/public-files/assets/PDF/NaturalYards-NativeShrubs.pdf gives suitable plants with a variety of heights for different sized properties, light and moisture conditions.
